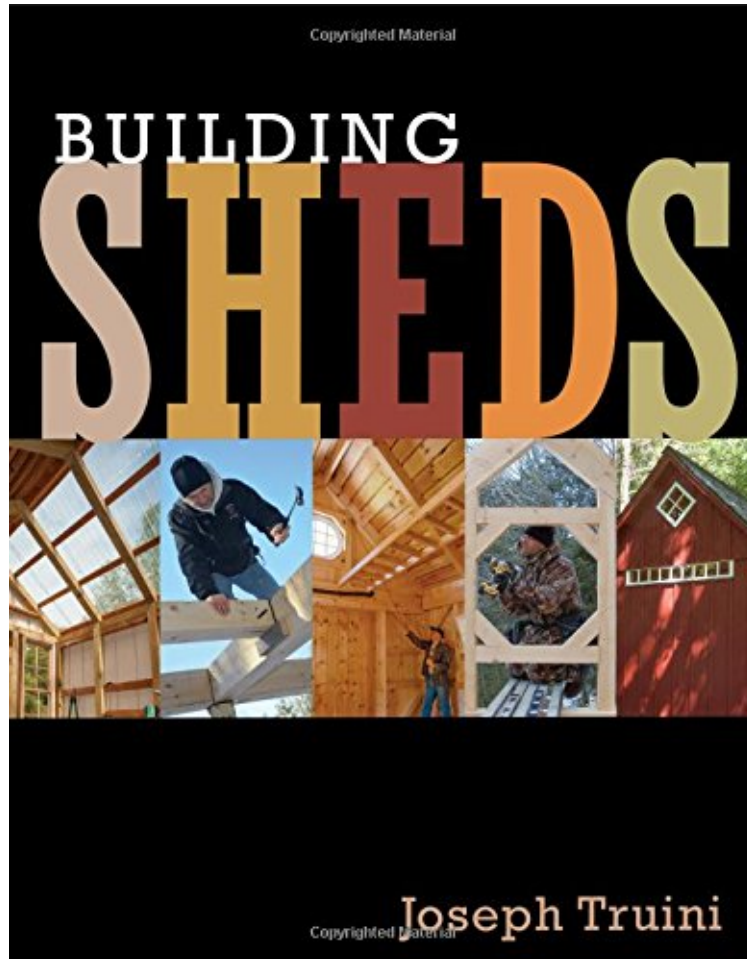

It is an instruction book on how to put together five different sheds whose plans, or kits, are available separately for hundreds to thousands of dollars. If you buy the kit, this book would be useful to show you how to build a truss, lay the foundation and floor, etc. But the book doesn't have dimensioned plans nor even a materials list ("buy so many two by fours; etc.") for any of the projects.The projects themselves are basically simple rectangular sheds gussied up in one case with round windows, or with cute doors and wooden awnings, mostly cosmetic add-ons. One could take a couple of days and reverse-engineer a buying list, counting the studs in a wall and multiplying by two, and then figuring out how many studs are in the short walls.This is the book that should come with a kit that you purchased ... FREE. Selling it is like making the customer

pay for the color catalog for five sheds. I bought this at a big box store and took it back for a refund. It is that disappointing. 1 of 1 people found the following review helpful. All You Need to Build a Shed with Character By Sean I had a lot of fun building a shed for the first time and this book pointed me in the right direction every step of the way. I used the red Board and Batten shed as a guide and found that no plans were needed if you followed along and have some basic carpentry skills. I was building into a tight space so reduced it to 7x7 and added shake siding for more detail. Almost every chapter provided useful information, and I borrowed ideas from the other sheds examples in the book. What the book didn't help with was how slow I am, as many weekends as this took you would have thought I was building a house. Making matters worse, I constructed most of it at my house, loaded the pieces onto a Home Depot flat bed truck and assembled at one of my rental properties.
